

Jeff Beavan

Jeff Beavan began playing guitar in his teens with a rock band in Middleville. He moved to Grand Rapids in the late 1960s and switched to electric bass playing with 'Daze End' performing across West Michigan and

neighboring states. I met Jeff around 1972 when he was playing dinner shows with Kenny Gorden. My friend, drummer Gerald Williams, was with Jeff in a band called Powerhouse. Through him I got to know Jeff well and that led to numerous gigs and collaborations together. Through the 1970s, we played top 40, funk, and fusion gigs, then shifted toward jazz, working with noted pianists Eddie Russ and the legendary pianist Claude Black, a Detroit-based Bebop player and an amazing musician that really turned our heads around!

In 1975, I moved in with Jeff and his family and occupied his couch for over a year. A daily ritual

was Jeff coming into the living room where I was still sleeping. Holding his coffee mug, he'd open the front window drapes and looked out at the street, then at me with a big sarcastic grin he would say loudly, "There it is Marsh, your hometown". There are so many great stories from that time where we shared memorable routines and crazy late-night episodes after gigs.

Jeff had a sharp, and sometimes irreverent humor. His catchphrase was "See you in a skinute." When he would be asked what that meant, he would say it was, in the measure of cosmic time, 10 seconds less than a minute.

Jeff was truly unique and will certainly be remembered with fondness and appreciation by those who knew him. We will recall many things; his talent, his love for music and gigging, his many hilarious stories, his delightful personality and camaraderie both on and off the bandstand. Along with his passion for reading books which influenced many, including myself. His legacy lives on through countless cherished stories about time spent with Jeff.

Max Colley Jr.

Max Colley Jr. dedicated over 40 years to music education at Northview High School, building a successful program with Marching, Concert, Symphonic and of course, his Jazz Bands, which received numerous awards. His music appreciation course was taken by hundreds of students, most not part of the instrumental music program. Max's goal was to foster a sense of belonging along with a greater appreciation for the gift of music.

Max graduated from Godwin HS, Grand Rapids Junior College, and Calvin College. His recognitions include Northview's first Exemplary Service award (1985), MSBOA "Band Teacher of the Year" (1988), and the inaugural WMJS Dr. Bruce Early Jazz Education Award (2016). He is presently being inducted into the Michigan Competing Band Association's Hall of Fame.

His favorite jazz musician was Stan Getz. Max believed jazz as an art form is passed down by generations. In that end, he brought in both local and national jazz artists to share their life experiences and talents with his students. Max took me to my first jazz concerts, which were Buddy Rich and Dizzy Gillespie. His example shaped my life and career both musically and personally. He was my first trumpet teacher and band director.

Max's Christian faith was the core of how he treated others, with care and inspiration. I am proud to call Max Colley Jr. my father. I know his legacy will live on for generations to come.

Kathy had a thousand-watt smile and a warm heart; she loved everyone she met. Kathy gave hugs freely and often, she could sing Jazz, Blues, R/B and Funk equally well. There are many heartfelt tributes and memories left on her Facebook pages. here are just a few of them.

Clark "Skip" Weymouth Memorial Fund



Carol Weymouth approached WMJS with an idea for a tribute to her husband's memory. The Clark "Skip" Weymouth Memorial honors the legacy of a dedicated musician who brought joy to seniors across the Grand Rapids area for over 20 years. As a talented pianist, Skip performed at retirement homes, nursing care facilities, and senior living communities, where residents would sing along using Skip's Senior Songbook-a special collection of songs he compiled just for them.

He also published a beloved newsletter, Musical Memories, which featured over 200 well-known selections for residents to enjoy. A committed advocate for local jazz, Skip volunteered as part of the West Michigan Jazz Society alongside its founder, Betty Forrest, sharing his passion for music and community throughout his life. Clark shared his love of music with everyone and had fun doing so.

For 65 years he was married to the love of his life, Carol, and together they raised three children. Their son Mark, a talented and accomplished drummer himself, carries on Skip's legacy and his love of music. This generous fund will be used to help students attend the Aquinas College Jazz Camp, offering half scholarships to 4 students for the next TEN years!

WMJS and the jazz community thank the Weymouth family for this generous donation.

2026 will mark the 40th anniversary of West Michigan Jazz Society!



In 1986, Betty Forrest began what later became WMJS. by establishing a support group to promote an annual Jimmy Forrest Scholarship. After Jimmy's death in 1980, Betty had established a fund through GRJO to award monies to students majoring in jazz studies. Monies for this fund were raised by presenting annual concerts that

featured popular jazz stars that Jimmy had known or played with during his 40-year career on tenor saxophone. For five years these concerts were held, 2 of those years the Count Basie Orchestra appeared.

Jimmy was the composer for the popular R&B tune, "Night Train", which was #1 on Billboard R&B in 1952 for 7 weeks. It was the 5th bestselling recording that year and is still played today by many artists. During his long career he played with such notables as Miles Davis, Duke Ellington and the Count Basie Orchestra for 7 years, and led his own combos.

There had been unsuccessful attempts before to

form a jazz society in Grand Rapids. A friend of Betty's, Ray Gill, was director of jazz studies at GRJC at the time, and he had a list of 20 names of previously interested people. Letters went out to them in January of 1986, a meeting was called and a dozen interested people showed up. The nucleus of what became the West Michigan Jazz Society was formed. The founding members were Betty Forrest, Ray Gill, Jim and Nancy Gould, Kathy Swets and Bob and Ginny Taylor.

In the first year the fledgling society grew to a membership of almost 150 people. In 1986 the first picnic was held at Caledonia's Emmons Park which became their "home" for the next 15 years. Those first years, when famous jazz players were still affordable, the society booked many wellknown artists. Some of those were Etta James. Clare Fischer, The Ramsey Lewis Quartet, Dave Frishberg, Gene Harris, The Four Freshmen, Diana Krall, and Kurt Elling.

For the first 25 years Betty Forrest did it all, big jobs, little jobs and everything in between. She was a force to be reckoned with! Over the years she finally began delegating the many duties to others, but at first, she really did them all. By 2001 national name acts became too expensive and WMJS began featuring our many talented locals. 2001 began the "Jazz at the Zoo series" which ran for an impressive 14 years with huge crowds in attendance. Unfortunately, the zoo needed to use the space we had occupied, and we had to move. In 2015 we secured the beautiful Ah-Nab-Awen Park located on the Grand River with downtown Grand Rapids as its backdrop. However, accessibility and parking became an issue. In 2019 we were given a wonderful opportunity to relocate to Millennium Park in Walker, where WMJS holds 10 summer concerts every year.

As WMJS continues to grow and thrive, we appreciate our members, sponsors and jazz lovers that help us keep jazz alive!
